### A Heart Attack May not Produce "TV" Symptoms...

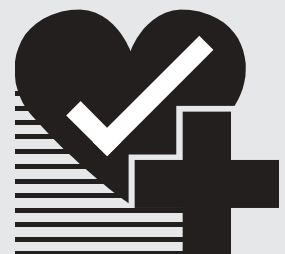
On TV, people clutch their chests in awful pain, turn red, and drop to the floor. In real life, heart attacks can take a very different form.

The more frequent symptom is a squeezing or tightening in the chest, say specialists at Tufts University. Or people often describe pain in the neck, jaw, left arm or both arms, possibly radiating from the chest. Sometimes people think they have a stomach problem.

Whatever the discomfort is, it may be accompanied by sweating, nausea and vomiting, lightheadedness and paleness.

Recognizing the symptoms is important. A study by the British Heart Association showed that people who knew the greatest range of symptoms were quicker to get to a hospital, often by many hours. It is vital to get medical treatment immediately. The faster drugs are administered, the less damage there will be to the heart muscle.

**A tip: if you stop what you are doing and your pain persists after 15 or 20 minutes, get to a hospital as fast as you can.**

# MEDIATION OR ARBITRATION?

I want to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to the Branch for the opportunity to attend mediation training. The training was presented by the Community Mediation Services Of Central Ohio with the cooperation of the Columbus Bar Association

Mediation is a voluntary process in which the parties to a dispute are aided in their settlement negotiations by a neutral third party called a mediator. Mediation is a non adversarial approach to resolving disputes. The mediator does not have the authority to impose a binding resolution. The role of the mediator and the goal of the process is to help the parties achieve their own resolutions. The mediator has many duties. Some of which are being impartial, maintaining confidentiality and to ensure the full and equal participation of all parties involved in the mediation process.

Mediation differs dramatically from adjudication and our arbitration procedures. In these processes, a judge or arbitrator

hears the evidence relating to a particular conflict and then determines who wins or who loses based upon the applicable laws and contractual regulations. In mediation, the parties control the outcome, and the potential exists for an agreed-upon solution which preserves the essential interests of all of the disputants.

Mediation enables the parties to communicate perceptions, feelings and information in a controlled environment. This manner of communication often reduces hostility and facilitates rational discussion.

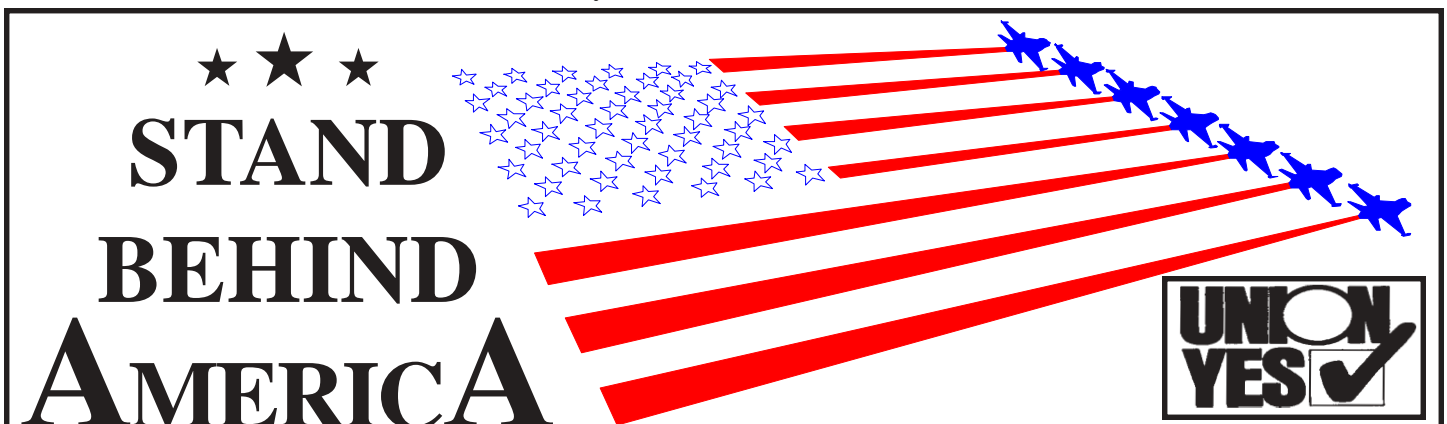
While courts and arbitrators are often limited to specific remedies, the outcome of a mediation is limited only by the nature of the problem and the extent of the parties own creativity. Mediation gives the parties a sense of ownership both in the dispute and its resolution, making voluntary compliance with the result more likely than in the case of an imposed solution. An additional benefit is that the lessons learned during mediation may also help the parties address future conflicts more creatively.

Mediation is currently being used effectively to reduce disputes in a wide variety of settings from schools to the world scene. Regardless of who is involved, the mediation process is proving to be an effective means of achieving sound, workable, lasting solutions by agreement rather than by compulsion. The parties are able to reach their own mutually acceptable resolution to the issue in dispute. The principles of mediation are universal. However, the manner of application may vary in specific circumstances depending upon the number of parties involved and the nature of the dispute.

All too often, Letter Carriers are forced into an adversarial confrontation due to a less than sympathetic and contractually challenged supervisor. Labor and management need to resolve disputes quickly, before they escalate and result in the need to use more expensive, time-consuming and stressful conflict resolution methods.

## How to contribute to **COLCPE** using PostalEASE

Letter carriers can contribute directly to COLCPE (NALC's Committee on Letter Carrier Political Education) from their paychecks using the Postal Service's PostalEASE. Through PostalEASE you can designate COLCPE as one of your two\* payroll "allotments."

- 1 Be sure you know your 4-digit USPS Personal Identification Number (PIN). If you cannot remember your PIN number, call PostalEASE at 1-877-4PS-EASE, select "1", enter your Social Security Number, select "1" to hear information about your PIN, and select "2" to have your PIN mailed to you.
- 2 Create your own *Account Number* by inserting in the spaces at right the first seven digits of the ID number that appears above your name on the back cover of your *Postal Record*.

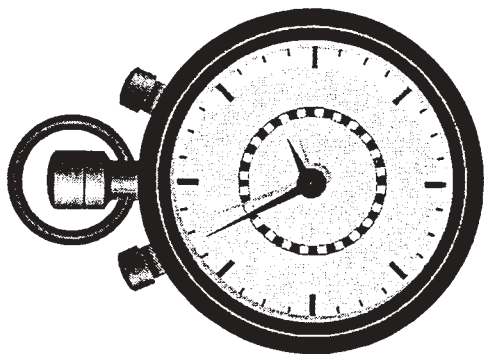

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# PROPOSED CHANGE TO ART. VII SEC. 3

## NOW READS

Section 3. (A) Officers Salaries. Effective 3/1/95 [1] The **President shall** receive a full top grade Letter Carrier's salary, Grade 2 Step O plus an additional sum of the \$188.00 per pay period. This additional sum of \$188.00 will become a fixed part of the President's salary, effective immediately. He/she shall further enjoy the entire Government fringe benefits appreciated by any letter carrier. He/she shall be granted the maximum for a letter carrier car contract. The branch shall pay the total amount for **Social Security**, both the Employee and Employer's part and membership dues. [2] the **Vice-President** shall be paid a salary of **\$375.00** per month, payable monthly. [3] the **Branch Recording Secretary** shall be paid a salary of **\$332.00** per month, payable monthly. [4] the Assistant Secretary-Editor shall be paid a salary of **\$282.00** per month payable monthly. [5] the **Financial Secretary-Treasurer** shall be paid a salary of **\$375.00** per month, payable monthly. [6] the Equal Employment Officer shall be paid a salary of **\$219.00**, per month payable monthly [7] the **MBA, HBR and NSBA Representative** shall be paid a salary of **\$125.00** per month, payable monthly. [8] The branch **Trustees** shall be paid a fee \$50.00 monthly. [9] the **Sergeant at Arms** shall be paid a fee of \$50.00 per month payable monthly. [10] the **Director of Retirees** shall be paid a salary of \$125.00 per month, payable monthly. (B) Any officer or steward serving the branch in a LWOP status for an accumulated period of eighty (80) work hours or more must submit their vouchers for payment within forty-five days of this accumulation or Branch 78 will not be responsible for this payment of lost Sick and/or Annual Leave.




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## CHANGE TO READ

\*Changes are in Bold

SECTION 3. (A) Officers Salaries. Effective **December 1, 2003**. [1] The **President shall** receive a full top grade Letter Carrier salary. Grade 2, Step O, plus an additional sum of **\$250.00** per pay This additional sum of **250.00** will become a fixed part of the Presidents salary, Effective immediately. He/She shall further enjoy the entire Government fringe benefits appreciated by any Letter Carrier. He shall be granted the maximum for a Letter Carrier car contract. The Branch shall pay the total amount for Social Security, both the employee and the employers' and membership dues. [2] The **Vice President** shall be paid a salary of **\$400.00**, payable monthly. **The Branch shall pay the total amount for Social Security, both the employee and the employer parts for hours scheduled at the office.** [3] The **Branch Recording Secretary** shall be paid a salary of **\$375.00** per month payable monthly. [4] The **Assistant Secretary/Editor** shall be paid a salary of **\$350.00** per month payable monthly. [5] The **Financial Secretary/Treasurer** shall be paid a salary of **\$425.00** month payable monthly. [6] The **Equal Opportunity Officer** shall be paid salary of **\$225.00** per month payable monthly. [7] The **MBA, HBR and NSBA Representative** shall be paid a salary of **\$175.00** per month payable monthly. [8] The Branch **Trustees** shall be paid a fee of **\$125.00** monthly. [9] The **Sergeant at Arms** shall be paid a fee of **\$200.00**, per month , payable monthly. [10] The **Director of Retirees** shall be paid a salary of **\$150.00** per month payable monthly. (B) Any Officer or Steward serving the Branch in a LWOP status for an accumulated period of eighty (80) work hours or more must submit their vouchers for payment within forty five (45) days of this accumulation, or Branch 78 will not be responsible for this payment of lost Sick and /or Annual Leave.

## HCR UPDATE

When I first learned of the USPS's intent to subcontract new delivery areas, my immediate reaction was, "They cannot do that! I'll file a grievance." After some study I learned that they can indeed "do that" under Article 32. My next reaction was "City Letter Carriers are professionals. No one wants a minimum wage, unproven, unknown person to handle their checks, bills, cards and parcels. Who knows what he will do with it when the weather gets bad and/or he gets buried in mail. This will kill the postal service. We will all lose our jobs." I know the Columbus Dispatch was contacted and a meeting was set up with two reporters. They thought It was a great story and

sympathized with us. After days of research, Interviews and writing, they presented the story to their editor. He rejected it as too controversial and an internal matter best left to us.

Now I know that was a blessing in disguise. Since that time I have found a passage in the City Carrier's Duties and Responsibilities Manual (M-41) that prohibits us from doing what I described. Section 152 — Restricted Activities says, "Carriers must not circulate or encourage the circulation of petitions for changes in the service." Any violations of the M-41 could potentially get a letter carrier fired.

It is important for us to fight

this; however, we must be careful not to cross any boundaries and to be ethical. Our national office has said we have been successful on stopping HCRs mainly in areas where established territory has been taken from us. We have two of those type grievances pending in Delaware. Also, in Delaware, there is some question as to what defines a HCR contractor relationship as compared to an employee/employer relationship.

Let's continue to fight these HCRs, however, let's be careful we do not get ourselves in trouble doing so.

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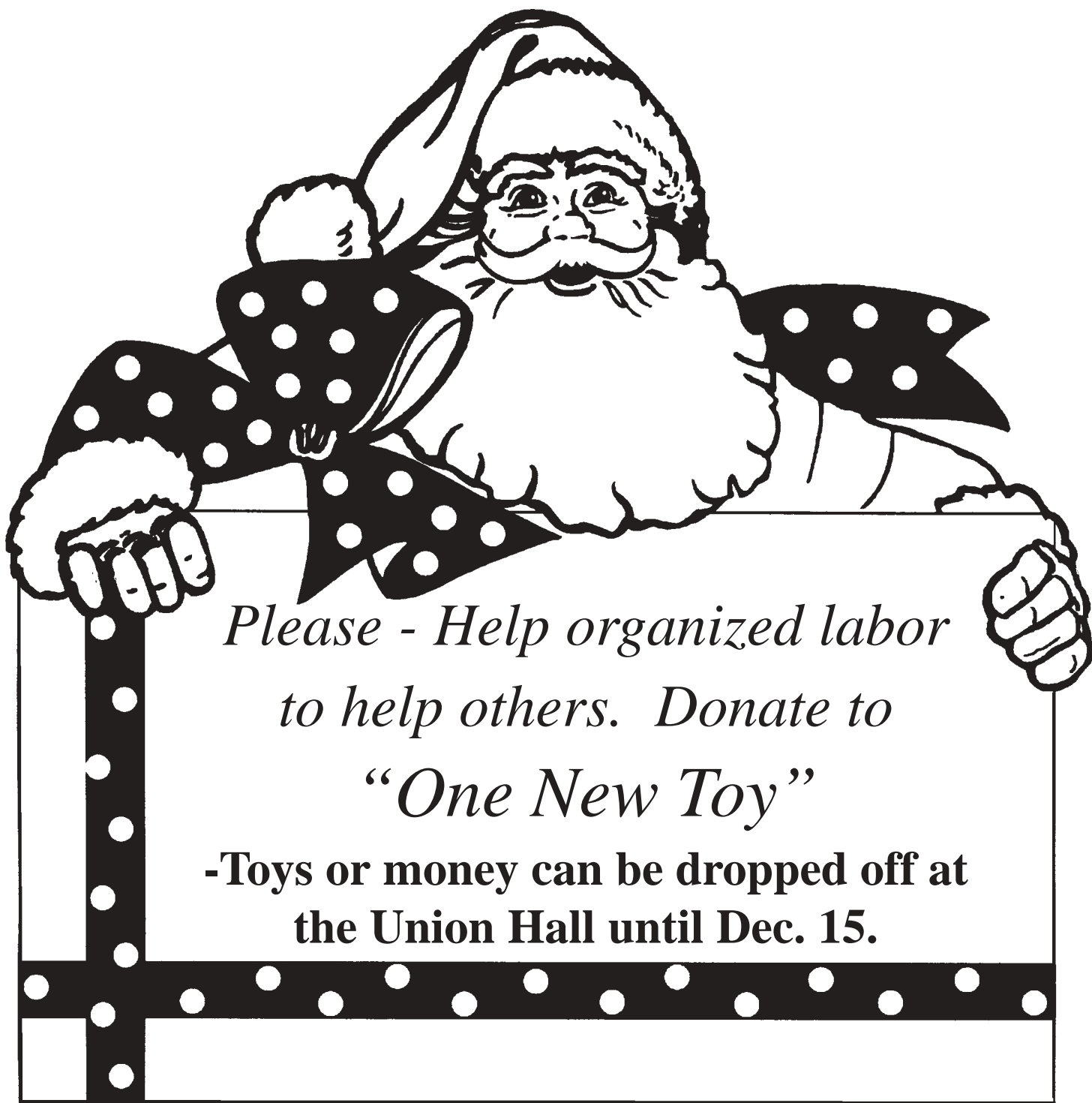
